There did come a few thorny occasions when the flag of the kingdom seemed sliding down. Their flag, once again heaved high in the sky thanks to the gallantry and brilliance of the people of Mewar.

This glorious tradition of the kingdom almost continued for 1500 years since its establishment, right from the reign of Bappa Rawal. In fact, only 60 years before Maharana Pratap, Rana Sanga, drove the kingdom to the pinnacle of fame. His reputation went beyond Rajasthan and reached Delhi. Two generations before him, Rana Kumbha, had given a new stature to the kingdom through victories and developmental work. During his reign, literature and art also progressed extraordinarily. Rana himself was inclined towards writing and his works are read with reverence even today. The ambience of his kingdom was conducive to the creation of high quality work of art and

- literature. These accomplishments, were the outcome of a longstanding tradition sustained by several generations.
- (3) The life of the people of Mewar must have been peaceful and prosperous during a long span of time; otherwise such extraordinary accomplishment in these fields would not have been possible. This is reflected in their art and literature as well as their loving nature. They compensate for lack of admirable physique by their firm but pleasant nature. The ambience of Mewar remains lovely thanks to the cheerful and liberal character of its people.
- (4) One may observe astonishing pieces of workmanship not only in the forts and palaces of Mewar but also in public utility buildings. Ruins of many structures which are still standing tall in their grandeur are testimony to the fact that, Mewar was not only the land of the brave but also a seat of art and culture. Amidst aggression and bloodshed, literature and art flourished and creative pursuits of literature and artists did not suffer. Imagine, how glorious the period must have been when the Vijaya Stambha which is the sample of our great ancient architecture even today, was constructed. In the same fort, Kirti Stambha is standing high, reflecting how liberal the then administration was, which allowed people from other communities and kingdoms to come and carry out construction work. It is useless to indulge in the debate whether the Vijaya Stambha was constructed first or the Kirti Stambha. The fact is that both the capitals are standing side by side and reveal, the proximity between the king and the subjects of Mewar.

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- (1) To ensure its perpetuity, the ground is well held by the panther both in *space* and in *time*. It enjoys a much wider distribution over the globe than its bigger cousins, and procreates sufficiently profusely to ensure its continuity for all time to come.
- (2) There seems to be no particular breeding season of the panther, although its sawing and caterwauling is more frequently heard during winter and summer. The gestation period is about ninety to hundred days (Whipsnade, ninety-two days). The litter normally consists of four cubs, rarely five. Of these, generally two survive and not more than one reaches maturity. I have never, come across more than two cubs at the heels of the mother. Likewise, graziers in the forest have generally found only two cubs hidden away among rocks, hollows of trees, and other impossible places.
- (3) Panther cubs are generally in evidence in March. They are born blind. This is a provision of Nature against their drifting away from the place of safety in which they are lodged by their mother and exposing themselves to the danger of their being devoured by hyenas, jackals and other predators. They generally open their eyes in about three to four weeks.
- (4) The mother alone rears its cubs in seclusion. It keeps them out of the reach of the impulsive and impatient male. As a matter of fact, the mother separates from the male soon after mating and forgets all about their tumultuous union. The story that the male often looks in to find out how the mother is progressing with her cubs has no foundation except in what we wish it should do at least.
- (5) The mother carries its cubs about by holding them by the scruff of their neck in its mouth. It trains them to stalk, and teaches them how to deliver the bite of death to the prey. The cubs

learn to treat all and sundry with suspicion at their mother's heels. Instinctively, the cubs seek seclusion, keep to cover and protect their flanks by walking along the edge of the forest.

- (6) I have never had an opportunity to watch mother panther train its cubs. But in Pilibhit forests, I once saw a tigress giving some lessons to its little ones. I was sitting over its kill at Mala. As the sun set, the tigress materialized in the twilight behind my machan. For about an hour, it scanned and surveyed the entire area looking and listening with the gravest concern. It even went to the road where my elephant was awaiting my signal. The mahout spotted it from a distance and drove the elephant away.
- (7) When darkness descended upon the scene and all was well and safe, the tigress called its cubs by emitting a low haa-oon. The cubs, two in number and bigger than a full-grown cat, soon responded. They came trotting up to their mother and hurried straight to the kill in indecent haste. The mother spitted at them so furiously that they doubled back to its heels immediately. There after, the mother and its cubs sat under cover about 50 feet (15 m) away from the kill to watch, wait, look, and listen. After about half an hour's patient and fidgetless vigil the mother seemed to say 'paid for'. At this signal, the cubs cautiously advanced, covering their flanks, towards the kill. No longer did they make a beeline for it, as they had done before.

Those who never have to change house become indiscriminate collectors of what can only be described as clutter. They leave unwanted objects in drawers, cupboards and attics for years in the belief that they may one day need them.

Old people also accumulate belongings for two other reasons, lack of physical and mental energy, and sentiment. Things owned for a long time are full of associations with the past, perhaps with the relatives who are dead, and so they gradually acquire a sentimental value.

Some things are collected deliberately in an attempt to avoid wastage. Among these are string and brown paper, kept by thrifty people when a parcel has been opened. Collecting small items can be a mania. A lady cuts out from newspapers sketches of model clothes that she would like to buy if she had money. As she is not rich, the chances are that she will never be able to afford such purchases. It is a harmless habit, but it litters up her desk.

Collecting as a serious hobby is quite different and has many advantages. It provides relaxation for leisure hours, as just looking at one's treasure is always a joy. One doesn't have to go out for amusement as the collection is housed at home. Whatever it consists of - stamps, records, first editions of books, china - there is always something to do in connection with it, from finding the right place for the latest addition

to verifying facts in reference books. This hobby educates one not only in the chosen subject, but also in general matters which have some bearing on it.

There are other benefits also. One gets to meet likeminded collectors to get advice, compare notes, exchange articles, to show off one's latest find. So, one's circle of friends grows. Soon the hobby leads to travelling, perhaps a meeting in another town, possibly a trip abroad in search of a rare specimen, for collectors are not confined to one country. Over the years one may well become an authority on one's hobby and will probably be asked to give informal talks to little gatherings and then, if successful, to larger audiences.

Detailed Answer:

Respected Chairperson, Honourable judges and all present.

I stand before you to express my views against the motion that the policy of reservation of seats for admission to the professional courses is good for the deprived sections of society. India is a country with dimensions and diversities. Accordingly, the Indian Constitution has adopted an egalitarian, secular and casteless society where injustice done to any class shall not be tolerated. But the report of the Mandal Commission reveals that millions of actual weaker sections of the society are still suffering from atrocities and caste-based inequalities. So, it is evident that some special privileges of reservation have proved to be a boon for some and bane for others. Even then the 'reserved' sections grumble that they have been made to suffer.

Here I want to ask whether reservation is fair to those of the general categories. In fact, it is a bane for those meritorious students. On the contrary, the so-called downtrodden or deprived sections enjoy the privilege. The non- deserving candidates are admitted into technical and professional colleges but the deserving candidates are unable to get admission because they belong to the 'higher classes' of society. In my opinion, it would be more suitable to provide opportunities for all the needy or deserving candidates without any discrimination and without the reservation of seats based on caste, creed, clan or colour. In fact, this reservation system creates division and fragmentation among the castes. It is nothing but a consolidation of vote-banks by the politicians at the expense of deserving candidates. How to Keep a Check on Population By– Karan

India is an emerging economy. We are rich in natural resources. Yet a significant proportion of our people is living below the poverty line. One cause of this poverty is our rising population. The problem of population explosion is a serious one as fifty thousand children are being born every day, dangerously increasing the already existing Indian population and thereby posing a serious threat to the very existence of Indians. The population explosion entails undesirable repercussions, begetting one problem after another. Millions of infants are bareheaded, bare-footed and have no clothes to put on. Such progeny has no future and it also creates hurdles and bottlenecks towards the progress and development of the country. In order to curb population explosion, the Indian Government started the 'Family Planning' programme that seems to be the only effective measure to check this problem, a number of subsidiary devices were also popularized, such as contraceptives and tubectomy for women and vasectomy for men. The Government offered lucrative incentives to endear devices like 'loop', 'condom', 'oral pill' and such other contraceptives that were made available to the public free of cost. Family planning officers visited the far-off villages to help the villagers with useful counselling, advice and concerned assistance. The minimum matrimonial age was raised to twenty- one years for boys and eighteen for girls. Truly speaking, mere law will not suffice to achieve the goals of the family planning programme. A diagonal change in the attitude of people is needed, that over-population is not a divine blessing but rather a demonic curse, and that poverty

It makes every-one shocked and sad that even after sixty- six years of independence, there is not much improvement in the condition of a woman in India. India is a country where the 'woman is worshipped' but perhaps only in books. If we see the real picture, women are unsafe not only on roads or at the place of their work but also at home. Superficially, it is said that the condition of today's woman has changed like anything but the reality states something different. Perhaps, a part of the society is unable to digest their upliftment.

Today, on one side, boys and girls are given equal education, equal opportunities in jobs, equal place at sports but on another side, this act of getting ahead costs them heavily e.g. If a well-educated girl gets married to a boy of the same standard, her parents have to give a heavy amount of dowry; if they don't do so, the girl may not get due respect. It should be kept in mind that if a woman appears frail at one moment, then she can, at another moment, come out as 'Goddess Kali' who killed demons mercilessly. Learning self-defense and the safety programmes, organized by some social service

groups and government will help them a lot towards feeling safe.

While teachers, principals, counsellors and even parents admit that it would be a futile exercise to ignore technology in the classroom, there is a very real fear that it will be misused by easily distracted students who have got to understand the pitfalls of the internet. According to a survey, instead of raising the standard of learning, computers were actually negating the healthy development of young students. But with technology and social media, the educational landscape has changed dramatically over the last decade; and the classrooms are filled with students who were born with a smartphone in their

hands. By the time they enter kindergarten, words like 'apps'. 'mp3', etc., are part of their lexicon. Water covers two-thirds of our planet. Having said this, only about two-and-a-half percent of our water stock is fresh water, only one percent of which is available for use by humans. By 2050, we will need to provide with

clean drinking water and food to more than nine billion people. But the alternatives for obtaining fresh water are limited. Thus, it is extremely essential that we should not waste it at home or at school and use it judiciously. Here are some tips which will really help us to save water. We should not waste water by draining it without purpose. All the taps should be closed properly in order to avoid unnecessary water drainage. Do not waste water by irrigating lawns unnecessarily. Lawns need water every 5 to 7 days in the summer whereas every 10 to 14 days in winter.
