ANSWERS WITH EXPLANATIONS

1. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The word happiness represents an intangible feeling or state of mind, which cannot be touched or seen physically but be only felt. Such words that denote ideas, emotions, or qualities, are categorised as abstract nouns. Since the sentence is describing a state of mind, happiness is correctly identified as an abstract noun.

2. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: The underlined word "wonder" expresses the action or mental activity of thinking with curiosity. Since verbs denote actions, states, or processes, wonder here functions as the main verb of the sentence. It is not an adverb, conjunction, or participle because it directly shows what the subject I is doing.

3. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: The word "every" distributes the responsibility of duty to each employee individually. Such words are classified as distributive numeral adjectives, as they single out each member of a group rather than referring to them collectively. It is neither an "infinite numeral adjective" nor a "definite numeral adjective," since its role is to distribute actions to individuals.

4. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: The word "righteous" normally functions as an adjective, but when preceded by the and used without a noun, it acts as a plural noun referring to people as a group. In this sentence, the righteous means righteous people. Hence, it should be identified as a plural noun, not an adjective.

5. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: The word "every" describes the noun "day" by referring to the frequency across the entire month. Since adjectives are used to qualify or modify nouns, "every" functions as an adjective in this sentence. It does not modify the verb rained, so it cannot be considered an

adverb. Hence, the correct classification is adjective.

6. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: "Therefore" is a discourse marker showing a logical consequence. The sentence suggests that because something has occurred, the speaker must ask for tolerance. "Thus" is similar, but slightly more formal; "for example" introduces an illustration, and "likely" indicates probability, which doesn't fit here.

7. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: "Indeed" emphasises and confirms the statement. It strengthens the idea that the eloquent expression exists. "Unengagingly" describes a manner (negative tone), "Somewhat" weakens the assertion, and "Fortunate" is irrelevant. Only "Indeed" appropriately signals confirmation and emphasis.

8. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: "In particular" highlights specificity, focusing attention on certain lines of argument. "Sui generis" means unique or of its own kind, "matter of fact" indicates neutrality, and "serendipitously" suggests coincidence, none of which convey the intended focus.

9. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: "Significantly" indicates that the issues are important and meaningfully influence relationships. "Somewhat" weakens the impact, "Unexpectedly" implies surprise, and "Overmuch" suggests excess. Only "Significantly" conveys the appropriate emphasis on the importance of these issues.

10. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: "Finally" fits best because the sentence suggests a concluding remark or the last option the writer proposes. It signals that after other arguments or points, this is the ultimate recourse. "Acceptably" suggests appropriateness, but it doesn't capture the sense of conclusion here. "Aggrievedly" and "Fatally" are clearly irrelevant.

11. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: "Lose" is always a verb (e.g., I lose my keys), meaning to misplace, be deprived of, or fail to win. "Loose" is mainly an adjective (e.g., a loose shirt), meaning not tight, slack, or movable. Other options confuse the part of speech or wrongly assign meanings.

12. Option (c) is correct.

Explanation: "Anyway" (one word) functions as an adverb meaning regardless or in any case (e.g., I will go anyway). "Any way" (two words) is a phrase meaning any manner or method (e.g., You can solve this problem any way you like). Options (a), (b) and (d) mix up their meanings.

13. Option (a) is correct.

Explanation: Allusion and illusion are both nouns, but with distinct meanings. Allusion refers to an indirect or implied reference, often used in literature. Illusion refers to a false perception, idea, or deceptive impression. Option (a) captures both definitions accurately, while the other options incorrectly classify the words as verbs, adjectives or adverbs.

14. Option (b) is correct.

Explanation: "Appraise" means to assess or evaluate (e.g., The jeweller will appraise the diamond). "Apprise" means to inform or notify (e.g., Please apprise me of any changes). Both are verbs, but their meanings are distinct. Options (a), (c) and (d) misidentify the parts of speech.

15. Option (d) is correct.

Explanation: Both climactic and climatic are adjectives, but refer to different contexts. Climactic relates to a climax or the most intense, exciting moment, often in drama or events. Climatic, on the other hand, relates to climate or weather conditions. Option (d) gives the correct classification and definitions, while the other options wrongly classify them as adverbs or verbs, or swap their meanings.
